A project is underway, financed from County Councillor May's budget, to install new seats around North Lodge Ward. Offers of seats from other sources have also been received and welcomed.





North Lodge in Bloom



The Parish Council's gardener, Frank Leighton (Pot-it-On), continues to maintain the flower and shrub beds in good order, aiming to make the Parish more attractive for residents and visitors. The three Jubilee trees are doing well and, at Picktree Lodge entrance, the Jubilee rose bed has been enlarged and the stone plinth has been pressure cleaned. Small flowering shrubs will be planted in front of the plinth. County Councillor May's budget is assisting financially both with this and the purchase of 25 flower tubs, the main project





for this year. The tubs have been placed throughout the Parish and will be planted with seasonal flowering throughout the year. The gardener will maintain the tubs but it would be helpful if residents living near any of the tubs could help with watering them during dry spells. The two tubs at the entrance to Lombard Drive have been planted up and will be maintained by the Year 7 Gardening Club at Park View School. There have been some incidents of vandalism to a few of the shrub and flower beds in the past 2 years and two of the tubs at the entrance to Picktree Lodge have had to be replanted already. The Parish Council continues to work with Durham County Council and the Residents Association to make horticultural improvements in the Parish.

As examples, choosing "Maps" will reveal the roughly oval parish boundary and show that the parish includes the whole of Drum Industrial Estate and Lambton Castle with most of its grounds, choosing "Minutes" will give you access to current and past council agendas and minutes, choosing Newsletters will give you the opportunity to read the 2010, 2011 and 2012 editions.

Durham County Council's County Plan

The County Plan Preferred Options documents, a significant step towards the finalisation of the County Plan, were issued during the last year. These have been discussed at length and concerns raised regarding the proposed extension of the Drum Industrial Estate, the proposed housing in Picktree Village and the extent of consultation with areas bordering the County, in particular with residents of Rickleton. The next stage of the plan is awaited.



BOUNDARY COMMISSION REVIEW OF COUNTY COUNCILLOR WARDS.

The first election for the new one-councillor North Lodge ward took place in May 2013, when Peter May (Independent) was elected.

TRANSIT 15 PROPOSALS

The County Council proposals for the Northlands Roundabout part of the scheme resulted in a very different new design, incorporating traffic lights and some major changes at the roundabout and in its feeder roads. The design was subject to public consultation in December 2012 and a final outcome may emerge during the summer months.

PAVEMENTS AND CAR PARKING

If you do decide to park on a pavement, please give consideration to pedestrians and ensure that this fully allows for their safe passage along the pavement. A maximum obstruction of up to one third of the pavement may keep you free from objections. There is usually no justification or need for parking on pavements where there are houses on only one side of a road.

SPEED VISORS

The three pairs of speed visors placed on Blind Lane, North Road and Picktree Lane, continue to act as electronic reminders of the 30 mph speed limits for traffic using these highways

.....AND FOR CONTINUING RESPONSIBLE ACTION:

...'a well trimmed hedge

Please continue to show consideration by ensuring that your hedges, shrubs and trees do not extend at all beyond your property's boundary with public footpaths (Highways Act 1980). Giving clear headroom of about 7 feet 6 inches is also important. This action should eliminate the risk of facial injury or damage to clothing and umbrellas, from thorns and branches, for all pedestrians.

PAVEMENT IMPERFECTIONS

Holes or ridges of at least 2 centimetres drop or rise can continue to be reported to the Highways Action Line (HAL) on 0191 370 6000 or hal@durham.gov.uk for email. Use the number on the nearest lamppost as a position marker and ask for a HAL reference number. The use of the website "FixMyStreet" is particularly helpful if you wish to pinpoint the position of a problem by using the maps provided. Concerns about roads may be similarly reported.

POLICE MATTERS

Report from Police Community Support Officer [PCSO] Lesley Hunter

Over the last 12 months, crime in Chester-le-Street has fallen for the 3rd year running and currently there are 223 fewer victims. Anti-social Behaviour has also fallen over the past 12 months with 806 fewer reports in Chester-le-Street. Regular patrols are still carried out in the area by me and colleagues and seem to be having the desired effect which is shown by the fall in crime etc. After the recent spate of Burglaries in the area, a youth was convicted of the offences and sentenced to 22 months in jail. Durham County Council traffic wardens regularly visit Park View School and several people have been warned with regard to parking issues. When I have been at

the school, nobody has been parking illegally. Just a reminder to check that your vehicles and house are locked as there has been a spate of thefts from unlocked vehicles and houses in the Chester-le-Street area recently. Personally, I am still enjoying working in the area and talking to residents at meetings and in the street. The council wardens are still working in the area with me as well.

The police telephone number is 101 for nonemergency calls but is still 999 for emergency calls. Here's to another good year ahead
