In terms of community property, the parish has regular monthly inspections of their principal assets, the 9 bus shelters in the parish, plus 8 internal glass display cabinets. (The glass shelter in Picktree Village has no cabinet). In those cabinets are the newly displayed winning and commended King Charles coronation art work posters, provided from the Parish and Park View School Community arts project competition. With Highways, all residents are asked to be vigilant for any fly tipping or damage around roads or pathways. Anything noticed should be reported to Durham County Council and/or the clerk or portfolio holder at North Lodge Parish Council. Fly tipping was removed earlier in the year from the grass verges of the A693, leading on to the motorway, at Blind Lane, so your help and support is appreciated

### County Councillor (and now Parish Council Vice Chairman) Craig Martin, will be working with colleagues to progress new schemes

and plans during the year. There are two vacancies existing on the Parish Council, so get in touch if you feel you can offer something to the team, and make your own contribution.

#### Merlin Drive

The refurbishment here was carried out last year and it is hoped to add another seat within the fenced area nearer to the gate. This has been requested by residents and will be funded with the help of our County Councillor.

Park View pupils planted daffodil bulbs within the fenced area and we hope to supplement these later this year.

#### Low Flatts

The refurbishment in this area has just been completed to meet current legislation. Residents helped choose the design.

We hope to add another seat within the fenced area and this also will be funded with the help of our County Councillor.

The goal posts have been painted for the continued enjoyment of this field.

These play areas now meet a very high standard and are well used and appreciated by the majority of our residents. We are delighted to have secured monies for these improvements from the developer contributions accrued from the Vigo Lane housing developments.



We ask for users of these areas to help us maintain the standards of health and safety by:

#### NOT ALLOWING DOGS WITHIN THE FENCED AREAS.

PICKING UP ALL DOG FAECES AND PLACING IN BINS PROVIDED.

#### NOT USING METAL DETECTORS ON ANY PLAY AREA.

My final year as Chairman was characterised by remarkable historical events associated with the Royal Family: the sad death of Queen Elizabeth II, and the accession of King Charles III, both of which gave rise to events in the Parish. I made the formal public Proclamation of the new King in the Parish on 11 September 2022; I presented Commemorative Badges to students of Park View School; first, in relation to the Platinum Jubilee in 2022, and then more recently in commemoration of the accession of King Charles III earlier this year.

Once again I was delighted to represent the Council at the Remembrance Sunday Ceremony, accompanied by veteran Councillor Elsie Forrester, and also to attend the North Lodge Remembrance Group Ceremony on Armistice Day. The Parish is proud to be associated with the work of the Group in the Parish.

Sadly, I represented the Council at the funeral of County Councillor, Beaty Bainbridge, a popular and industrious councillor who will be missed by many.

We have been very pleased, also, to work closely, once again, with Park View School, our most significant community partner in the Parish; we supported their development of sensory facilities at the School and the introduction of new mental health counselling support. And, for the second year, the North Lodge Parish Council and Park View School Community Arts

Awards Scheme led to more students receiving awards for artwork to be displayed throughout the Parish. I was pleased to be part of the judging panel and also to make the presentations once again this year.

Pam Hall, Head teacher, said she was thrilled by the tremendous support that the School had received from the Council during the year, and looked forward to further collaboration in future.

On Policy and Governance, this year the Council received reports concerning remote meetings, the LGA Civility and Respect Pledge, the new LGA Code for Members, the latest planning reforms, the County Durham Devolution deal and we developed a new Environmental and Diversity Policy.

## Crime & Community Safety

Once again, North Lodge parish area continues to experience very low crime rates compared to other areas of Chester-le-Street and County Durham.

There have been a few issues in the parish regarding car parking. Please report any issues to police using telephone number 101 and the parish clerk.

It is good to see the police are continuing with speed monitoring in the parish. When available, the results are displayed on the council's social media accounts.

Durham Constabulary has been involved in many initiatives and operations. These include road safety issues including illegally using a mobile phone whilst behind a steering wheel, knife and bladed article collections and firearms. The constabulary promoted information on mental health issues, details on how to seek help if a victim of stalking and how to avoid becoming a victim of a scam.

Operation Snap, this allows the public to submit dash cam footage of unacceptable driving. Operation Trident, county wide operation to arrest persons for various neighbourhood crimes.

Across the county, there has been an increase in the theft of motor vehicles. Predominately, key less vehicles which are then either sold on, stripped for parts or used to commit crime. Residents are advised to take measures to improve the security of their vehicles.

Co. Durham and Darlington Fire Service has been officially rated as "Good" for Effectiveness, Efficiency and People, by His Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabularies and Fire and Rescue Services. The service has also been awarded the UK Fire and Rescue Service of the year for the second year running, at the IESE Public Sector Transformation Awards, along with a

Public Service Award at the The Northern Echo County Durham Together Awards.

The service is working hard with other community partners to promote personal safety at waterside locations. Please take care when beside rivers, lakes and streams.

Residents are reminded to check smoke alarms, to make sure the alarms are working correctly. If residents need help to fit an alarm contact the Community Safety team for advice, using telephone number 03452234221.

Key crime prevention messages for our residents.

- a) Please remember to lock vehicle doors when stationary and unattended. Remove valuable items on show from vehicles.
- b) In the summer months, remember to close windows, lock garden sheds and secure garden furniture.
- c) In the dark winter months, consider using lamp timers to give the impression that the property is occupied when you are away from it.

The council reminds residents to report any crime or community issues to the appropriate authorities. Merely commenting on social media only, may not resolve the problem.

At the recent CDALC Council Forum held in May 2023, Councillor Forrester was nominated and voted into the position of Chairperson once again for the following year 2023/2024.

Parish finances are reviewed on a monthly basis.


The Parish's year end accounts are independently audited and this year, once again, are confirmed to be sound and to be of an appropriate standard for the Parish.

The removal of 9 barrels which had deteriorated and will be replaced sometime in the near future.

The 2 large shrub beds on North Road have been cleared of old growth and the walls repaired. A major replanting scheme will commence later this year.
